Swallows Class went back in time to September 1939, when we were evacuated from London to the little village of Dennington. We used evidence from our school's log book from the time for some interesting details about how evacuees felt about this experience. We listened to Chamberlain's war announcement in the church and wrote postcards home to our families. We then walked (with kind permission) to the pillbox to explore how that would have been used in WWII. In the afternoon we did some cooking using recipes from the time.

The lead up to Christmas has as always been very exciting and busy. On Tuesday we had a special visitor – Father Christmas. He met with all the children and handed out gifts. On Wednesday we were off to Colchester Theatre to watch Peter Pan. The highlight of the festivities, though, was Chaffinches' and Robins' class performance of the nativity story which was called The Littlest Christmas Tree. We were all so proud to see how the children's confidence has grown and to witness their fantastic acting, singing and dancing skills!

CHURCH BOOKSHOP



I had to look up what a Collared Earthstar was!

When I was dropping Sonja home after the Kurling Christmas Party (19th December), a woodcock flew up in front of the car on Wood Road and settled on the other side of the road, allowing us a good look. Although a nocturnal bird, we thought it might have just arrived from the continent. The next day I saw a Chinese Water Deer for the first time at Brick Kiln. I had seen one just the week before, close to the water tower in Dennington. This one seems to be hanging around - Richard has since seen it around the fields. They are larger than a Muntjac but smaller than a roe deer. Like the Muntjac, the males grow tusks - giving them the name Vampire Deer. This is another escapee breed from Whipsnade Zoo that has gradually populated East Anglia.

Everything seems very quiet at present BUT we will see how it unfolds during the year of 2025. Please contact me when there is anything you need reported.

Let There Be Light

The right lighting can deter would-be criminals and help you and your neighbours keep an eye on your property.

One of the easiest ways to deter burglars is to install motion activated lights around your home. An instant burst of light will alert you to movement and startle a potential intruder.

Timers for internal lights will give the appearance of your home being occupied even when you are out or away on holiday. The ERA Protect Floodlight Camera looks and works like a regular spotlight but additionally sends a live feed to your smartphone so you can monitor your home from anywhere in the world.

Neighbourhood Watch Alert

There has been a NHW scam doing the rounds. It has not affected Badingham

NHW but I have made sure everything is updated for security.

Driving Ban

An Ipswich man has been banned from driving for 6 months for driving without insurance. He was fined £660 for the offence. In addition, Suffolk Magistrates ordered him to pay a surcharge of £264 as well as legal costs. In total, £1014. Get your insurance when it is due!

Drugs

A mid-Suffolk man has been imprisoned for 16 weeks as he failed to comply with the conditions of his suspended sentence. Sgt Allard commented: "Class A drugs are responsible for wreaking havoc in our communities". Anyone in our village with drugs on their mind, consider the consequences to yourself and others.

WaterSafe

NHW is advising residents to ask plumbers working on their drinking water supply on simple question: "Are you using lead-free solder?" Plumbers sometimes use solder to join pipes and make connections. Lead dissolving into your water can build up in the body and cause health issues, with babies and young children most at risk.

Sonja's Archives

Badingham is a small, spread out village with plenty of things going on but, at the same time, a very pleasant place to live... THUMBS UP... never DOWN!

Badingham Church – William Dowsing appointed parliamentary visitor to the churches of Suffolk in 1643 with the job of destroying superstitious ornaments etc. Smashed sixteen cherubims belonging to this church. How dare he!

Badingham School originally in Low Street (which now is the Village Hall) moved up to Rectory Road. Mrs Barnard was Headmistress in the 1950s – I remember her very well.

Beside the old Village Hall entrance, next to Malcolm and Megs drive, was A H Watson's General Store. I used to pop down on my bicycle to get sweets.

Oakenhill Hall - this is Crackenhill Hall of the book 'Joseph and his Brethren' – a fine read which has claim to being the best of all rural novels. The book was first published in 1928, written by H W Freeman.

Several farms had Suffolk Red Polls, a breed of naturally hornless cattle which is noted for its docility, longevity and thriftiness. Fine Suffolk traits! The Red Poll is a good milker and the steers make excellent beef animals.

FARMING UPDATE

When Julian asked me about our patches of re-drilled land, wondering if it was an environmental scheme, I thought it time to restart my occasional series about farm life.

Conditions were better for drilling this season but on parts of the headlands (the edges of the fields which see more farm machinery traffic) the seed did not establish well. These patches have been sown again. It's not an easy decision, pulling up ground and using more seed but we weren't alone in this. Many farmers are still experiencing the effects of prolonged rainfall in 2023 that led to waterlogged fields.

Last year we renewed some old land drains which had collapsed after the persistent rain. These drains had been dug by hand by Dad and Alfred 'Bob' Shelley back in the 60s. Our heavy land is good at retaining moisture in dry spells but needs good drainage. Ditches are cleaned on a regular rotation to help drains run freely. Fortunately, not as much needs to be done by hand these days.


Today, we enlist the help of our cousin Richard Barnes whose father went into the land drainage business with John Chilvers from Bowling Green Farm. Coming from at least 15 generations of Suffolk farmers, we like to think that between us we have inherited enough practical genes to help us cope with our unpredictable weather.

I hear a number of farm contractors have rejected a sizeable block of land a few miles from here because it is poorly drained; showing just how important that is to good growing conditions.

It was slow coming but the re-drilled seed has pricked through on the row. Helicopter pilots are doing a marvellous job scaring greedy pigeons off of the young plants!

This year's Suffolk Tractor Light Parade raised over £12,500 for the Air Ambulance, Suffolk Libraries and the Eastern Community Assistance Team. Thousands of spectators lined the route – a spectacle enjoyed by all ages. Their support for the farming community was much appreciated. Richard will tell you that decorating tractors is not a 5 minute job!

Supporting local businesses will be key to strengthening our economy in the year ahead. By expanding opportunities for skills development and apprenticeships, we can help ensure that young people across Suffolk have the tools they need to secure fulfilling, long-term careers within our own communities.

As always, I am here to listen and, first and foremost, to act on your behalf. If there is an issue you feel needs attention or a cause you would like me to support, please do not hesitate to get in touch. This year presents an opportunity to build on our progress so far and I look forward to hearing from you and meeting many more of you in the New Year.
